

Lobbying/Lobbyist

According to Wyoming State Law (28-7-104), public officials acting in their official capacity do not have to meet the requirements for Lobbyists under Wyoming State Statute 28-7-101 through 103.

The Converse County Elected Officials all belong to organizations that may lobby on behalf of a county official at the local, state, or national level. Generally, each elected official has a corresponding statewide association. Some may also belong to national associations that lobby on behalf of that elected official in conjunction with their counterparts in other states to affect the outcome of legislation.

All counties in Wyoming belong to the National Association of Counties (NaCO) – an organization on the national scene that addresses many issues for all elected officials across this nation.

At the local level, county elected officials meet with their legislators prior to the convening of the legislature. The elected officials will, throughout the legislative session, be in touch with any number of legislators throughout the State of Wyoming, to offer thoughts and concerns as the legislative processes unfold.
